

English Language Learners Course Syllabus

Course Description

This course provides teachers a foundational knowledge of first and second language acquisition and literacy development, explores tools and strategies for selecting curricular materials, making literacy and content more accessible to English learners, and discusses equitable assessments that better support English learners for success in the classroom. addresses all the English Learner Professional Development Quality Standards, Completing the course meets English Learner Professional Development Quality Standards and the required 45 clock hours.

This course enhances classroom teaching effectiveness and supports improved student outcomes by providing foundational knowledge of language acquisition and literacy development, with strategies for selecting accessible materials and implementing equitable assessments aligned with English Learner PD Quality Standards.

Assessments and Grading

At the end of each module, there will be an assessment/test to assess your mastery of the objectives. Each module test is worth 15 points, except module 8 (2 test/20 points). The total points for this course are 185. Your grade is calculated by adding up all the points. This course uses Pass/Not Pass for final grades. Successful completion of the course is 80% or higher or 148 points or more.

Checkboxes and Completion Progress

This course uses completion tracking - which are the checkboxes you see to the right of the items listed within the course. Those with solid lines you can check yourself. Those with a dotted line will be marked when you meet certain criteria.

The checkboxes are for you to keep track of where you are in the course. Successful completion is determined by your grades. An explanation about the checkbox is included in the instructions for each item.

<u>Solid Line Checkbox Criteria:</u> These tend to be content resources you may wish or need to refer to several times before you consider you are "done" with them. Therefore, it is up to you to check the box when you feel you are done.

<u>General Dotted Line Checkbox Criteria:</u> These tend to be assignments, tests and required readings. Course Syllabus is set as a dotted line and will be marked once you have viewed it. This is a check used to make sure you get off to a good start. It does not mean that you do not or will not need to refer back to this resource.

Completion Progress Block

The completion progress block provides you an overview of the checkboxes.

- Green: You have successfully completed the activity.
- Red: The expected due date for completion has passed. (There are no due dates for assignments.)
- Blue: A future activity.

You can hover over each box to see the name of the activity. Clicking on the box will take you directly to that activity.
