Course Description

Course Objectives

- 4. Evaluate how extended families contribute to student learning, emotional support, and cultural expectations.
- 5. Assess the impact of different parenting styles and expectations on student motivation and long-term academic achievement.
- 6. Discuss the unique experiences of students from LGBTQ+ households, adoptive families, and foster care, and identify ways to create an inclusive school environment.

- 8. Develop a comprehensive action plan for fostering a more inclusive and supportive educational environment that acknowledges and accommodates diverse family structures.
